Exco gives go-ahead for Rupert's Valley container handling development

Two weeks ago Exco deferred a decision on the development application for Rupert's Valley for more information of some important details. This week Exco approved the development application for container handling facilities after receiving some extra information which Exco members thought was adequate and satisfactory.

The extra detail requested was the same as previously asked for by the Land Development Control Authority but was not provided. This time there was no problem providing some extra detail which Exco eventually concluded was adequate for their purpose. First on the list was the leak from a fuel pipeline and knowing the extent of the contamination the leak had caused. The chartered engineer for the development project stated that further investigations into the extent of fuel contamination will be made by the Fire and Rescue Service later this year when more trial pits will be dug as part of the foundation works for the development. However it is predicted the investigations will not find any contamination. It is not reported that the required foundations should be planned for exactly the same locations at the suspected fuel leak contamination was remarked upon as a coincidence and the reliability of the crystal ball used to predict that no contamination would be found is not reported to have been questioned. Any further risk of contamination resulting from the unused pipeline collapsing was also dismissed as negligible.

The current state of historic structures were also assessed; these are Rupert's Lines, the No.1 Building and the Garden Wall, part of which separates the new development from Hay Town House; an historic building which lies just outside the development area. The assessment found that parts of this stone wall had crumbled and assurance was given that the wall would be repaired as part of the development project. No assurance was mentioned that there would be prompt repairs to any future damage caused to the wall by trucks and reach stackers moving around in what is to be the break bulk and cargo yard. The yard is enclosed by the garden wall.

The Number One Building or hospital is surrounded by new development but Exco members were advised the development work does not intend to 'touch' the building. As part of the project work existing trees and shrubs which have grown around the building will be 'cut back' to make the building more visible. If the cutting back follows the usual method used, the vegetation will have grown back in two years or so. No questions were reported to have been raised on the exact method for removing the trees and shrubs,

Next was Rupert's Lines. The issue here is whether the security fence will be fixed to Rupert's Lines. Treating an

historic structure in this way is not recommended in planning guidance on the treatment of historic structures which get crowded out by new development. It was first pointed out that the public toilet and the BBQ shelters are already fixed to Rupert's Lines. The defence line has also fallen down "in some areas". In another gesture of magnanimity the BBQ shelters will be separated from the defence line and the sections requiring repair will receive attention within the limits of the project budget. As for the security fence being fixed to the wall, Exco members were told the fence will not be connected to the wall and "no aspect of the project will physically touch the wall". The fence will abut, not touch Rupert's Lines.

Exco members are reported to have expressed satisfaction that the importance of historic structures had been recognised and that some work was planned to improve the current state of these structures. Regrettably, those present at the meeting were either ignorant of, or chose to ignore the clause in the Land Planning and Development Control Ordinance which stipulates "Buildings and their settings" should be taken into account when assessing their architectural, cultural, or historical significance. Whether the security fence touches or abuts Rupert's Lines is not the issue. The security fence detracts from the appearance and historic significance of the Lines and abutting it instead of touching it is irrelevant to the main consideration; a consideration which was ignored.

The Exco Report on the Rupert's Development discussions included, "The importance of recognising, alongside the physical historical features of Rupert's, the **sentimental** side of history in terms of African heritage and the Liberated African remains was noted." The physical historical features of Rupert's have not been adequately recognised and the references to the African heritage are inexcusably inept.

Honest, Diligent, Faithful and Sober This perfect human being was a slave

A St Helenian slave named Dick was awarded a medal for good behaviour on three occasions, 1802, 1803 and 1806. He was, the medal tells us, honest, diligent, faithful and so-

ber. 'Good behaviour' are inadequate words to describe this apparently perfect human being for whom a roughly made medal was the only recognition given to him. The same medal

was used for the three awards.

The medal is one of many exhibits at the Jamestown Museum where the permanent slavery exhibition has recently been extended to mark the International Day for Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition on 23rd August. The date chosen commemorates the slave revolt in the French colony of Saint Domingue which started on the night of the 22 August 1791 and continued until 1804 when the French colony won its independence and became present day Haiti. The slave revolt in 1791 is seen as the start of a long road to liberation for millions of enslaved Africans. While this massive revolt was taking place, Dick in St Helena twice received a pat on the back for being such an ideal person. Despite his excellent character he received nothing but a recyclable medal. However the importation of slaves to St Helena was made illegal in 1792.

Public access to the Rupert's Valley excavation site was allowed on one occasion when the remains of 325 liberated Africans were removed in 2008 to make way for the Haul Road. There has been insufficient political or administrative will to provide a respectful burial site for the disturbed remains.

St Helena makes increasing use of the digital virtual world

In June we reported that St Helena Tourism was increasing and expanding its use of digital communication by linking up with online travel training to give thousands of holiday booking agents loads of information about St Helena and how to book holidays here. The travel training platform offered by OTT made it possible for St Helena Tourism to target the UK, France and Germany; keeping St Helena in the front of the minds of tour operators and booking agents at a time when use of digital communication had sky-rocketed during the pandemic lockdown.

Now, with the bicentenary of Napoleon's death fast approaching and no end in sight to travel restrictions due to the coronavirus pandemic, Michel Martineau is adopting the approach - if they cannot come to us, we must go to them. The hopes for a busy tourist period in May next year soon evaporated as Covid-19 spread across the world and everything, just about, was closed down. One of the worst hit business sectors is tourism and travel in general. The programme of events planned for the bicentenary was slimmed down and aspirations changed from international to local involvement. Michel aims to 'go to them' since 'they cannot come to us' by using digital video communication to transmit the planned bicentennial events to anywhere in the world with the participation of any and all media companies and digital platforms that wish to be involved. The economic benefit to the Island will not be as significant as weekly and special flights unloading tourists at the airport but it will mark the bicentenary in a much better way and keep St Helena as a tourist destination in the minds of millions as they watch bicentenary events unfold on St Helena. When the pandemic has been tamed it is hoped the frustrated and locked down tourists who have been starved of travel will remember St Helena.

Also moving to virtual travel to get to meetings overseas by using digital communication are representatives from St Helena Research Institute and the South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute based in the Falklands. They are now included on the agenda of the Virtual Island Summit organised by a global digital platform call Island Innovation. Island Innovation organised their first Virtual Island Summit *Continued on NEXT PAGE*



Two weeks ago the Independent carried a report on the current position with the long-standing attempt to put together the next stage of the application for World Heritage Status. The experts in the UK who send the application from St Helena to the United Nations assess the application first. This panel of experts concluded there might be a chance of getting World Heritage Status for the green environment part of the application but the built heritage part of the application was below par and needed further work - probably a polite way of saying 'forget it'.

Being the optimist I am I thought a re-think on how the application is presented might get the built heritage application over the line. That was two weeks ago. Now I'm not so sure. After reading the justifications put forward in this week's Exco Report by the project engineer for the Rupert's development on how the historic structures and their settings are being treated I think it is probably time to give up all hope that St Helena's treasures will be recognised, maintained and celebrated in the way they should.

Making development control decisions on what appears to be only the advice of an engineer is not just misguided it clearly

indicates there is no-one in government who has the slightest clue what good quality town and country planning is all about. Good planning is more than development control; it includes a range of disciplines and professions. Calling in an engineer to tell Exco members the security fence protecting the container handling area will not touch Rupert's Lines, it will be one inch away from it - so that makes everything alright, exposes the woeful state of planning in St Helena. There are many real built heritage gems in St Helena which require the respect they deserve if they are to be preserved for future generations. The careless, unthinking attitude which is continually given to these precious assets will be seen by our children's children as unforgivable and stupid. Putting a cargo handling yard next to anyone's house would not be allowed to happen anywhere else in the civilised world. In St Helena it is carefully placed next to an historic house which is a listed building. This decision and others like it do not show St Helena in a good light. To many we become a laughing stock.

UPDATE ON CHARTER FLIGHT DETAILS SEPTEMBER 2020

Further to the press release issued on 7 August, St Helena Government (SHG) is pleased to announce the confirmed aircraft and route for the September charter flight.

The aircraft selected is the Titan Airways Boeing 757-200, the same aircraft which operated the charter flight in July.

The flight will depart from London Stansted and fly direct to St Helena with a technical stop in Accra. The aircraft will then overnight on St Helena before operating a shuttle service to/from Ascension Island. On completion of the shuttle service and a second overnight stop on St Helena the aircraft will fly directly back to Stansted including a further technical stop at Accra.

This 23 August, we honour the memory of the men and women who, in Saint-Domingue in 1791, revolted and paved the way for the end of slavery and dehumanization. We honour their memory and that of all the other victims of slavery, for whom they stand. (...) To draw lessons from this history, we must lay this system bare, deconstruct the rhetorical and pseudoscientific mechanisms used to justify it; we must refuse to accept any concession or apologia which itself constitutes a compromising of principles. Such lucidity is the fundamental requirement for the reconciliation of memory and the fight against all present-day forms of enslavement, which continue to affect millions of people, particularly women and children."

The transatlantic slave trade was the largest forced migration in history, and undeniably one of the most inhumane. The extensive exodus of Africans spread to many areas of the world over a 400-year period and was unprecedented in the annals of recorded human history.

As a direct result of the transatlantic slave trade, the greatest movement of Africans was to the Americas — with 96 per cent of the captives from the African coasts arriving on cramped slave ships at ports in South America and the Caribbean Islands.

From 1501 to 1830, four Africans crossed the Atlantic for every one European, making the demographics of the Americas in that era more of an extension of the African diaspora than a

The legacy of this migration is still evident today, with large populations of people of African descent living throughout the Americas.

2020 Theme: "Confronting Slavery's Legacy of Racism Together"

One devastating legacy of the transatlantic slave trade was racism. Historically, it was used to justify the enslavement of Africans. And today, it has led to people of African descent being relegated to the poorest and most marginalized sectors of society. The 2020 theme underscores the reality that lasting effects of the transatlantic slave trade, including racism, continue to divide societies across the globe and hamper our advancement towards a world that respects human rights and enables sustainable development for all. Only through confronting these legacies can we truly promote inclusion and move forward together.

When Slavery was abolished in the UK 1807, the colonies had not, St Helena included. The 400 years of enslavement of African people left behind an island fundamentally altered by centuries of systematic discrimination against the enslaved and their descendants. The effects of slavery on the island echoed through the earlier half of the nineteenth century. Through the Black Lives Matter Campaigns, we acknowledge that globally the descendants of enslaved people continue to face violent intimidation when they have transgressed social boundaries or asserted their civil rights, and the criminal justice system continues to target people of colour. Globally, these legacies have yet to be confronted.

In commemoration of the International Day for the Remembrance of Slave Trade and its Abolition, The Equality and Human Rights Commission along with the Museum of Saint Helena will be launching an addition to the permanent exhibition on the history of slavery in Saint Helena on the 24th August 2020. The expansion on the exhibition aims to acknowledge the victims of slavery by embarking on a truth telling and reflective journey about 400 years of slavery on Saint Helena and its Legacy.

DRAFT POLICY FOR COMMUNICATIONS NETWORKS AND SERVICES FINAL CALL FOR COMMENTS

A draft Communications Networks and Services Policy has been out for public consultation since Monday, 13 July, and will be closing on Monday, 7 September 2020. The draft Policy and consultation questions are available online at: www.sainthelena.gov.sh/government/public-consultation/

The Communications, Networks and Services Policy has been developed to update the current Telecommunications Ordinance and set the framework to regulate the development of communication services on the Island and provide sustainable and reliable long-term benefit to the end-user. With just under two weeks left for comments it is essential that anyone with an interest in the future of communications on St Helena take the opportunity to look at the Policy and provide comment.

The major changes to the Ordinance that the Policy recommends include:

- Introducing a **Universal Service Obligation** to ensure that people and businesses on St Helena have access to services wherever they live on the Island and at an affordable cost
- Introducing Consumer Safeguards and Quality of Service standards within licence agreements
- · Introducing Price Controls to represent good value for consumers
- Introducing a Cable Landing Licence for future subsea cable landings
- Introducing a **Communications Regulator** to supervise and enforce compliance with conditions placed on licensees.

Thank you to all those who have provided feedback through the consultation meeting at the Museum, through emails and other correspondence. During the consultation period one of the concerns raised relates to the role of the Governor in the interception and surveillance of electronic communications data. The proposals in the Policy are seeking to update the legislation in such a way as to ensure the people of St Helena can be confident that their electronic communications data is safe, whilst ensuring data can be obtained when it is only absolutely necessary to do so. St Helena Government recognises the concerns that have been raised and will look again at who should be designated with the authority to approve requests for surveillance and interception and for what reasons.

Once the consultation period has ended all comments will be considered and amendments made to the Policy. This will then be submitted to the Economic Development Committee for final approval. The public will have a further opportunity to comment during the development of a new Communications Ordinance.

Background

In December 2019 SHG signed a contract with Google to secure a Branch in Phase 1 of the Equiano Cable. The broadband service provided from the Branch will be a transformational improvement for St Helena.

Naturally, the Telecommunications Ordinance needs to be refreshed to get the most out of St Helena's transformational digital modernisation. In doing that, a Draft Policy for Communications Networks and Services has been developed to set the framework by which to update the Telecommunications Ordinance.

The Telecommunications Ordinance already contains powers for the Governor to request details of the traffic passing over the telecommunications on St Helena. These powers are delegated to the police for investigatory purposes. The police need to be able to retain the ability to investigate suspected criminal activity. Access to electronic communications data is an essential component of the powers needed by the police.

In light of comments received during this consultation SHG is considering the appointment of a Surveillance Commissioner who will be responsible for approving surveillance and interception requests, removing the responsibility from the Governor. **SHG 27 August 2020**

for governance of the island. The Sarkin report was very thorough and was further summarised by the findings of the publication of the Governance Commission Report. Your subsequent editorial commentary on these reports explaining both Committee and Ministerial points of view are commendable. Personally, I prefer the Ministerial model as a way forward for the island. It would be far less cumbersome than a Committee system and also more efficient and productive. For sure, mistakes will be made initially but these are worth persevering with for the greater good.

I am also anxious that the move forward should not be hampered by delving too much into the past, or considering how things were done. Such thoughts and sentiments are in the past and we need to 'bite the bullet' and go forward, or, as they say in the U.K. 'grasp the stinging nettle' and go forward. If not, we will be in the same situation as we are with reviewing and streamlining the medical testing for drivers over 70 which is now pondering in its seventh year of consideration by the relevant departments and Coouncillors..

At a meeting with Prof. Sarkin he did indicate that it should be very possible to implement a new system by our next General election. Let us hope this will be the case. Our requirements for future government should be for things to happen promptly otherwise we fall into 'Parkinson's Law' where work, or thought's, expand to fill the time available and we end up marking time and going backwards. **Yours sincerely, Jack Horner**

We thank you for your patience during this period of transition and will inform you of further information relating to these changes as soon as they have been confirmed by our service provider.

A Press Release only for the Obsessively Curious

This week a press release popped up on the computer screen telling all those who are interested that a drop-in session is taking place this morning at the Jamestown Market on the proposed Judicial Relocation Project – Phase 2. Everyone, the press release announced, is encouraged to attend and provide comments. Based on the information provided, the encouragement to attend was conspicuously absent.

This particular press release should be held up as an example of how NOT to write a press release and used during every course on how to communicate as an example of a complete communication failure. Based on the exciting information given about this once in a lifetime opportunity it is certain that if you go the Sandwich Bar this lunchtime you will pushing through a dense crowd of 'Members of the Public' who are fighting their way to the front to offer their comments on Phase 2 of this project.

Maybe this press release was a test. Did the SHG information office purposely send out a press release which was designed to be incomprehensive and uninformative just to see if there are any media people who are awake and have the investigative instincts required to find out more. Who knows? Obsessive curiosity is thick in the air at the *Independent* so an email was immediately pinged off the Head of News asking what exactly is phase 2 of this particular relocation. Kerisha, of course, promptly came back with the fulsome answer which should have been in the press release when it was first issued.

Phase 2 of the Judicial Relocation Project, as proposed, is centred around the Court House. Suitably confidential consultations rooms will be provided for Lay Advocates and their Clients. There will also be a dedicated vulnerable witness room, a holding cell, or maybe two, together with direct and secure access between the Court Room and the Jury Room

What's on at Legislative Council Today

The formal business at Legislative Council today consists of a performance audit of primary and secondary education and reports from the Public Accounts Committee for their last three meetings. Next come the questions from councillors which are answered by committee chairmen or government officials.

Christine Scipio wants to know what action is being taken to regulate taxi fares while Corinda Essex asks why copies of all published SHG official reports and documents are not kept in the public library. Councillor Essex continues by asking what new funding has been identified by the External Funding Co-ordinator and what is the estimated value of the new funds?

Christine Scipio has tabled a further question, asking if the current public transport system meets the objectives set out for it and is adequate for current demand. Dr Essex has a third question listed which asks how many technical co-operation posts have been localised in the past three years and how many more are planned to be localised by 2023.

Only Christine Scipio and Corinda Essex have submitted questions for answer during this meeting of Legislative Council. Why other councillors do not do the same to get information into the public domain remains a question to be answered. The final item on the Order Paper for today's Legislative Council is a motion from the Chief Secretary who is formally proposing there should be public consultation on the two systems of governance for St Helena developed through the work of Professor Sarkin and the Governance Commission. This is a formality; your Elected Members are unlikely to deny you the opportunity to have your say on such an important matter.

Governance Commission Report



Last week the Independent gave some details on the Governance Commission Report which had just been published. We gave an outline on why it is thought an improved system of government is urgently required and the shortcomings with the committee system which is used at the moment. We also touched upon what system of government might replace it. This would be either an improved committee system or a ministerial system of government. This week we go into more detail on what the Governance Commission says about how the committee system could be improved and what difference the improvements might make.

Just to recap, the Commission looked for ways to improve (among several other things) political responsibility, political accountability and decision-making. 'Political' means the elected representatives; 'responsibility' means having a particular elected representative who is responsible for decisions made for a particular area of government business. 'Accountability' means having a particular elected representative responsible for the actions taken as a result of these decisions and delivering the expected results. The Commission also concluded that decisions should be made more promptly and it is the elected representatives who should be responsible for making prompt and effective decisions.

The trick is, to have a system of government which can always hold the appointed elected member responsible and accountable. The system should also make is possible to make prompt and effective decisions

Improving the committee system

Committees usually make decisions through all members of the committee being in general agreement. There may be one or two members of a committee who disagree with all the other members. When this happens the majority of committee members may try to find a way to accommodate the concerns of the minority of committees members who disagree. The tradition is for committees to make decisions by general consent. It is not often a decision is put to a vote, leaving the minority of committee members losing their argument when the decision goes against them. Not putting a proposal to the vote usually means decisions are deferred while ways to include the opinions of all members of the committee are investigated so a decision can be made by general consent.

Political Responsibility

At the moment there are seven committees, each with five members including the chairperson and the vice chair. The Commission suggest in their report that the committees could be reduced from 5 members to 3, or even 2. It is possible that the Chairperson of the committees would then assume a more obvious responsibility for decisions. The important items of committee business will be discussed again at Legco, Exco and other informal (closed door) meetings which all councillors attend. A change of this type is thought by the Governance Commission to offer the opportunity to increase the political responsibility of the chairperson by a moderate amount.

Political Accountability

Giving more political accountability to Committee Chairpersons is thought to be possible to a small extent but it would not be easy. The number of committees could be reduced to five and aligned directly with the five directorates proposed for the new government administrative structure. A clear alignment of committees with directorates would help to achieve clear lines of communication and decision making between the chairperson of a committee and the director responsible for carrying out the decisions made by that committee. However there would still be a separation of responsibilities between the committee which makes the decisions and the director who has the responsibility to carry out the decisions. The chairperson, as the elected representative with most of the political responsibility could not be held fully responsible for any delays, mismanagement, or inadequate corrective action, when responsibility for the implementation of the committee decision lies with the director concerned. Even when there are found to be flaws in the original decision made by the committee, the chairperson cannot be held fully responsible because it was a collective decision made by the committee.

Any committee system shares responsibility for decisions made; committees are not designed for giving sole responsibility to an individual either for the committee decision or the adequacy of the government administration to carry out the decision. For these reasons the Governance Commission considered any improvement resulting from these changes would also be moderate.

Timeliness of Decision-making

Improving the decision-making process by reducing delays, deferrals and duplicated debate may be possible if the number of elected members on each of the five committees is reduced. Councillors who are not members of any particular committee will continue to have the opportunity to make their views known through the continuing range of informal councillor's meetings. The usual public consultation processes will remain an important part of the overall process. It is entirely possible that contentious issues will continue to demand extended periods of discussion even when all known options and the opinions for and against have been fully debated and consulted upon in public at least once. The Governance Commission thought an improved committee system would only result in a minor improvement in the disciplined, focused and methodically analytical decision-making which is widely accepted as required.

Next week the *Independent* will report the Governance Commission's view on how a ministerial system of government is expected to work using the three criteria – responsibility, accountability and timeliness.

THE CONSTITUENT FRAGILE DEMOCRACY DEFENDED

Dear Electorate,

The recent police investigation of your elected representatives concluded with no criminal or civil action against any elected member. Within our evolving democratic system of local governance, the correct balance between openness and transparency and maintaining respect and responsibility for confidential and sensitive documents and information, according to good conscience and integrity, was upheld by elected representatives.

However, H.E. Governor Rushbrook remained concerned for the possible irresponsible public disclosure of SHG confidential and sensitive documents and information by elected members.

Accordingly, elected members had extensive discussions on the Governor's concerns and his stated considerations and actions. Governor Rushbrook had implemented various forms of restricted and conditional access to ExCo closed agendas, closed agenda documents and the minutes of ExCo closed sessions to non-ExCo elected representatives; and he also warned of revoking Gazette 64/2017. In so doing, the Governor would be seriously undermining local democracy by drastically reducing the current measure of democratic process and procedures that all twelve elected representatives exercise on behalf of constituents.

Local democracy, already weak, had now become seriously fragile and therefore had to be defended. Elected members did not choose five of our colleagues to serve on ExCo with the expressed consent to work in isolation and secrecy with the Governor and SHG officials and officers without proper channels for democratic scrutiny and accountability.

The current wording of the Oath of Confidentiality in the Constitution is excessively undemocratic. The Gazette 64/2017 provides a legal compromise. It therefore enhances democracy and, with conditions of respect for the Oath of Confidentially, allows for some democratic openness and transparency to inform constituents.

After all twelve elected representatives discussed the matter at length, the Speaker and ExCo Elected members were asked to advise the Governor against reversing the 2017 enhancement of St Helena's democracy.

Consequently, Governor Rushbrook has agreed not to implement the restrictive measures that will have a direct negative impact on local democracy, but informed elected members that he must reserve the option to amend the access arrangements if a future instance occurred where safeguarding of confidential information was compromised.

Bearing in mind the importance of openness and transparency in a democratic society, Governor Rushbrook was given reassurance that confidential and sensitive documents and information will be treated with due respect by all elected representatives when communicating with constituents.

COVID-19 RELATED ACTIVITIES

EXPENDITURE MARCH - JULY 2020

As part of St Helena's response to the COVID-19 Pandemic a number of preventative measures have been put in place to ensure that we are best placed to deal with the virus in the event it reaches the Island.

In April 2020, St Helena Government (SHG) received positive news of an additional £2.5 million of budgetary support from the Department for International Development (DFID) for the Island's preparations to mitigate COVID-19 impacts.

SHG has today published an analysis of spend on COVID-19 related activities between March and July 2020 - a total of just over £1.5 million (£1,522,000).

A breakdown of this expenditure is summarised below and detailed on the attached infographic:

Bradley's Camp Quarantine Facility and Operations

£678,000 has been spent to date on the refurbishment of Bradley's Camp. Initially used to house overseas workers during the construction of St Helena Airport, the Camp has been transformed into a dual purpose medical and quarantine facility.

£147,000 has been spent on the running costs of the facility following new arrivals to the Island undergoing 14-days of compulsory quarantine. This includes Camp staff wages and salaries, security, catering, cleaning products and materials, telecommunications, utilities and general operating costs. These costs also account for when the facility is unoccupied.

Maintaining Access to St Helena

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£302,000 has been spent on three repatriation flights, two from the UK and one from South Africa. These flights were arranged to bring home St Helena and Ascension Island residents including medical referrals and carers in Pretoria.

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Business Support

In March 2020, following the additional measures implemented by SHG to prevent COVID-19 from reaching the Island, Government approved support mechanisms for three months to reduce the burden on local businesses. A second phase of hardship support was introduced between July and September 2020 to keep people in the Hospitality sector on the Island in employment. **£225,000** has been spent on Enforced Self-Isolation Support, Hardship Support and Business Closure Support packages.

Health Resources and Support Staff

The UK Government has provided funding, through the Conflict, Stability and Security Fund for additional medical staff to support St Helena's COVID-19 preparedness. These posts are a Biomedical Scientist, Anaesthetist, Physiotherapist, General Doctor, five General Nurses and an Intensive Treatment Unit Nurse.

SHG has spent £45,000 on recruitment costs for these additional staff as well as additional Health support staff - Project Manager and Public Health Support Officer.

Equipment, Supplies & Services

£125,000 has been spent to date on additional medical equipment including four ventilators, a Flu Pod for the General Hospital, Personal Protective Equipment and Medical Supplies.

Separate funds have also been spent on bolstering the stock of pharmaceuticals on-Island in order to treat patients if the virus reaches the Island.

The UK Government has also provided medical supplies including a ventilator and ancillaries, COVID-19 testing equipment and a Blood Gas machine to the value of £119,000.

SHG appreciates the continued support of the UK Government in helping us mitigate the impact of this Pandemic on St Helena.

Results Day at Prince Andrew School (PAS), with the former Year 11, 12 and 13 students of PAS receiving their Statement of Results for their GCSE, AS, and A-Level studies, was held on Friday, 21 August 2020.

Students, along with their parents, guardians, and invited guests attended the short ceremony held in the PAS Lecture Theatre.

PAS Head Teacher, Penelope Bowers, welcomed all in attendance and explained that the Statement of Results that would be given on the day did not reflect the correct official grades from all examination boards. As was the case in the United Kingdom, the results issued by examination boards

Are Regular Direct Flights to UK Possible?

We all want to see direct flights from St Helena to London at reasonable prices, people in general are reluctant to accept Johannesburg as the hub for air traffic to and from St Helena. The St Helena Independent is taking a brief look at the possibilities of flying direct, with only a technical stop, to London on a regular basis. St Helena Independent does not claim to be any expert on aviation but are in contact with people more familiar with the air service industry.

The world is currently facing the Covid-19 pandemic which has to a great degree stopped tourism development around the world. In this article we are looking beyond the end of the pandemic where we hopefully will have some kind of normality.

Back in 1999, St Helena Leisure Corporation (SHELCO) launched a bid to build an airport on St Helena, also to run an air service and a major leisure complex. The concept introduced by SHELCO, the 'Three –legged Stool' is still relevant to the problems St Helena is facing.

SHELCO proposed to use a Boeing 737 BBJ Business Jet for their air service. The plane could land in St Helena and fly more or less to any destination in the world without problems. However, the small number of seats available would have made this luxury flight quite expensive.

'The three-legged stool' concept was introduced to enable all parts of the puzzle were ready for operation at the same time. Build the airport, start the airline and open the Leisure facility, all at the same time. None of the three components would be viable without the support of the other.

After SHELCO's proposal was turned down in 2004, the reality still remained, all the components have to be in existence before St Helena could develop any tourism economy and also provide reasonably priced access for Saints here and overseas.

DfID consultants decided that St Helena should use Johannesburg in South Africa as a hub to reach UK and the rest of



the world, unfortunately neither Saints nor wealthy tourists were impressed. Everybody still wanted to fly directly to UK or at least to a destination in Western Europe.

To be able to have any success in flying to Europe we need a certain number of passengers and a certain amount of freight, otherwise it will not be viable for any commercial airline to take up the route.

At the same time, we are limited to a fairly short runway at St Helena airport which is preventing large, wide-bodied aircrafts to land. As we know, any aircraft used must have a considerable range to be able to reach UK with only one technical (refuelling) stop on the way. As second stop would be too costly.

The problem for St Helena now, in 2020, is to find an airplane with the capacity, the range and the capability to land on a short runway. At the same time we have to find people to fill up the airplane with paying passengers and cargo on a weekly basis.

Recently, we have seen two successful landings by Titan Airways' Boeing 757-200, which is an excellent airplane for the European flight and can take almost 200 passengers (dependent on configuration). The two flights from UK have not been commercially viable but have been subsidised by DfID. This has partly been the fault of the Covid-19 pandemic and the shortage of quarantine space but even under normal circumstances it would have been difficult, if not impossible to fill the plane with passengers and cargo to make it into a profitable operation. Somebody has to pay for the shortfall, it does not appear that DfID would be willing to pay.

Even if somebody would be willing to pay for this service, the Boeing 757-200 is a more than 20 years old plane and most western airlines are selling them off to buyers which I doubt anybody in St Helena would look forward flying with.

Most expertise has ruled out the Boeing 757-200 as a plane to use for a future connection to UK due to its age and high fuel consumption. As said before, it is also a big question mark over how we can attract enough passengers to pay for the journey.

Our current Airlink flight to Johannesburg, using an Embraer 190, can carry its own costs according to SHG, obviously this was before the Covid-19 outbreak but it is hard to believe that it is a very lucrative operation.

The Embraer 190, which is used by Airlink is hardly suitable for the long journey to UK and offering high paying tourists to fly the distance in such a small plane would most presumably be futile.

Most people in the aviation industry only have two suggestions for aircraft which can do the distance and land on St Helena, they are the Airbus A319 and the Airbus A220 (former the Bombardier CS100). The most likely one being the A319, which can take 134 passengers in normal configuration.

Both these aircraft types could theoretically take on the route from St Helena to UK but the question is still – at what cost? Most likely to cost would be prohibitive for most Saints and where should the potential tourists stay and do on the Island? Mantis, or other hotels and accommodation options cannot cater for the tourists who are most likely to be attracted by a very expensive destination.

If we are looking at flying to the UK, or at least Europe we are missing two and a half of the legs on the three-legged stool. We don't have an airline (airplane), we don't have suitable leisure facilities to cater for the amount of people we need to make air service and the runway is too small to accommodate aircraft which potentially could be suitable. It is not an easy solution to this problem.

Nobody, it has been tested, want to invest in a hotel without

air service to Europe and nobody can start an air service to Europe without a big hotel to look after the passengers when they are on the Island.

Some aviation buffs have looked at many different solutions to our problems, maybe by servicing other destinations than St Helena to fill up the plane and create a route system maybe with Cape Town, Brazil or destinations in Africa. Nobody have so far been able to come up with an idea which would be viable for the airline operator and the needs of St Helena.

As far as we can assess the situation, people should be careful in putting too much hope into the possibility of reasonably priced regular air service to Europe in the near future.

We should not be too gloomy as there might be other possibilities to develop the Island. There might be opportunities in the wake of the submarine cable and improved electronic access. For an Island as remote as St Helena the internet link will be one thing which put us on par with the rest of the world. Hopefully we are wise enough to grasp this opportunity even if it does not give us air access to UK, at least not in the short to medium term.

We can also hope that Mr O'Sullivan has success in finding investors for his Broad Bottom project, but as Covid-19 is still ravaging the world and it will make it difficult for any high risk tourism development to attract money for many years to come.

Next week we will look at some interesting ideas and prospects for the Island to make some 'sustainable development'.
