

Plans for Trade Winds Ocean Village Revealed

On Monday Paul O'Sullivan will start an information campaign to support his forthcoming public consultation in St Helena on proposals for the Trade Winds Ocean Village; a large scale development at Horse Pasture. The development application is fully prepared and will soon be formally submitted to Land Planning and Building Control for consideration.




The site boundary for the proposed Trade Winds Ocean Village is shown with a heavy black line

The main features of the development are a luxury residential estate comprising 140 - 150 houses built in phases as the demand for house purchase dictates. The first phase is planned to have 15 houses. A pool, club house, tennis court and parking area will be provided for Trade Winds Ocean Village residents. Transport within the development will be by electric buggy only, as part of the green environmental principles underpinning the development.

Communal facilities for island residents will also be provided to continue the long tradition of camping and picnics on Horse Pasture. This communal facilities are provided on 8 acres (or 32,312 square metres) of the development site and will include camping and picnic sites, BBQ areas, children's adventure and playground area and washing facilities. The communal facilities will be at the south end of the site and have parking for 40 vehicles.



Plans for Trade Winds Ocean Village Revealed

Nature Trails are another feature of the development. It is intended existing trails will be used and improved upon to help create access to all parts of the site and to the best viewing points. The Service Area will include the manager's house, laundry, store, maintenance and operational facilities and refuse collection area.

The residential housing will be built with solar panels designed to provide most of the electricity required. Water supplied to residential dwellings will be from on-site rainwater capture into plastic tanks at each house. A secondary supply of water will be available from a pressurised ring main supply throughout the development. The water supplied to the ring main will be from bulk tanks located at the upper end of the site adjacent to the parking area. The tanks will use rainwater collected from the roofs of administration buildings. Further water supplies will be available from the nearby Golf Estate development when built and from the island-wide water supply as and when required. It is anticipated the on-site water collection systems will provide all water consumption requirements when both developments are completed.

Waste water is planned to be disposed of using a biolytic digester where it is treated and processed before passing into a local irrigation system to supply nutrients to the soil in residents' gardens. Storm water on the sloping site will be managed by creating small bunds to channel surface water evenly across the site and retain some of it in small quantities if required to drain into the ground.

The Environmental Impact Assessment is expected to be completed in a few weeks. If the findings require some changes to the proposed development they will be incorporated before the application is formally submitted for consideration by the Land Development Control Authority.



One of the six different house designs proposed for the Trade Winds Ocean Village. All six designs share several features including as many bathrooms as there are bedrooms, spacious patio areas, open plan kitchen, dining and living areas and storage and utility rooms.



The show house at the top of Sapper Way is of the same style and method of construction proposed for the development at Horse Pasture. The timber houses will be imported in kit from South Africa and assembled on site. The Planning and Design Statement with the development application will state the proposed house design has a low environmental impact on the construction footprint and avoids the need for unsightly and disruptive excavations into the hillside.

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
Editorial

A few weeks ago I had a telecom problem. Ever had one of those? Of course you have. My email and internet kept cutting out every few minutes; more frequently sometimes. I phoned the Fault Line at Sure from a phone when I was in town. My phone was giving me aggravation as well. The following morning at 9am a white Sure van pulled up outside and two electricians immediately climbed the nearest pole and started checking connections. Then they checked the next pole further away and on they went down the line. They eventually were out of sight when I went out to see if any progress was being made. I sang a verse or two of 'I am the lineman for the county' in a loud voice but did not get any reply. Eventually they reappeared and asked me to check my phone, email and internet to see if they had got the connection back. They had. I asked them how far they had to go before finding the fault. It seems a main cable somewhere near the Briars was rubbing on something and got damaged. "Fault on a main cable and I'm the only one affected? Someone's picking on me!" We chatted for a short while about how inconvenient it can be not having a driving licence and then off they went to sort out someone else's problem.

The following morning a girl with a cheerful voice phoned and asked me if I was happy with the repair and everything was working OK. It was. "On a score of 1 to 5 how do you rate the service you received" she said. I told her 4.5. The thing should not have gone wrong in the first place, I never give a 5. That was that.

Not long after I got an email with an attachment; 7MB of attachment which landed on my desk top. Then it came again, and again. The same email bouncing around cyberspace and landing in my computer repeatedly. My small and expensive megabyte allowance was disappearing fast. I phoned the Fault Line again and spoke to a boy on the other end of the phone. After me explaining the problem he told me the limit is 10MB after that something happens to turn emails into rubber balls which come bouncing back (remember that song by Bobby Vee? Remember Bobby Vee?). "I told you this email is only 7MB, why is it doing this to me?" I was getting desperate; I've never known Sure give refunds and that's because they are never wrong. The boy on the Fault Line did not have any answers and could not find anyone that might. He said he would get back to me. He didn't. Neither did the cheerful girl ring up the following day to ask if I was deliriously happy with the service Sure had bestowed upon me.

This week I got an email with a 9MB attachment. The same thing happened. The rubber ball email bounced back to me 25 times! I will have to see the bank manager before I pay this month's Sure bill. Happy %(*%@ Christmas to you too! I blocked the email but that only sends it to the junk mail, the megabyte counter on my screen still soars ever upward. The only thing that gets rid of bouncing emails seems to be when



the whole system closes down at midnight and 6am when the free period starts and then stops again. The person in South Africa who sent the 9MB attachment replied to my email saying, "That's obviously a Sure problem. The only place this happens is on St Helena and it happens a lot. I never get this from anyone else I send to, except on St Helena. As you can see, it only went out from me once". I understand the Sure licence is under review either right now or pretty soon. Whoever reviews the licence should take with a pinch of salt the customer satisfaction figures resulting from the phone calls made by the girl with the cheerful voice. I suspect she only phones when she knows everything went well. As for me, I now live in fear of receiving emails with attachments; I need therapy!

St Helena's financial assessment clears the bar "Invest in St Helena" say global financial analysts

S&P Global published the result of their assessment of St Helena's financial and economic stability and gave an "investment grade" rating which will help attract investors who are thinking of putting money into St Helena. Standard & Poor's (S&P) is one of the big three credit rating agencies who make widely respected assessments of the overall financial health of a country and then give a rating which investors and developers use as a reliable indicator when considering whether or not to make an investment.

The S&P Global assessment is heavily influenced by the fact that St Helena is continually and reliably supported financially by the UK Government. The opening statement in the S&P Global assessment makes this clear, "Political and Brexitrelated uncertainties in the U.K. are unlikely to disrupt the continued institutional and budgetary support that the U.K. provides to St. Helena and which underpins the sovereign rating". The sovereign or country rating is given as BBB in the assessment. This is defined as "Investment Grade: Adequate capacity to meet financial commitments, but more subject to adverse economic conditions". More subject, that is, to adverse economic conditions than a country rated 'A' which is defined as, "Investment Grade: Strong capacity to meet financial commitments, but somewhat susceptible to economic conditions and changes in circumstances." The highest credit rating is AAA which means, "Investment Grade: Extremely strong capacity to meet financial commitments." At the other end of the scale is the D rating which is handed out to a country which has defaulted on a financial commitment, broken a promise or is facing bankruptcy proceedings. The lower ratings are labelled Speculative Grade which does little to attract inward investment.

S&P Global Ratings

The introductory overview of the assessment dated 4th December goes on to say, "The Island's remoteness and developing infrastructure, combined with a nascent private sector, constrain St. Helena's growth prospects in the medium term." However it is recognised the private sector is beginning to display signs of its future potential. The overview concludes with "The stable outlook reflects our expectation that the U.K. government's strong and ongoing support will continue to underpin St. Helena's creditworthiness over the next 12 to 24 months." It is usual for credit rating to be re-assessed at roughly 12 month intervals which is the reason why S&P Global do not forecast a credit rating for a period longer than 12 to 24 months. However when commenting on the outlook for St Helena the assessment adds, "The stable outlook balances our expectation of strong and ongoing support from the U.K. government and gradual economic reforms that could broaden economic sectors over the next two years. We could raise the ratings if the pace of St. Helena's economic growth is materially stronger than we currently forecast. Under this scenario, private sector growth will support St. Helena's revenue

through tax collection and potentially limit its external financing needs. We would lower the ratings if the U.K. financial support diminishes and St. Helena's taxation policies are unable to compensate for that revenue. We could also lower the ratings if a severe natural disaster were to affect St. Helena's economy."

The reasoning behind the credit rating given is explained as, "The ratings on St. Helena reflect the strong and ongoing institutional and financial support of the United Kingdom. The Island's balanced budget principles and the absence of debt accumulation will continue to support its creditworthiness over the medium term.

However, the ratings are constrained by the island's remote location (with flights reaching it only once per week for most of the year) and weak economic growth trends and prospects. We view St. Helena's monetary assessment as constrained, owing to the lack of a central bank, which limits independent monetary policy, and the currency peg to the British pound. We expect these rating strengths and weaknesses to persist through 2022."

The section of the assessment called Institutional and Economic Profile, the assessment points out, "St. Helena has moderate wealth levels, measured by GDP per capita of US\$12,500 in 2019. However, real economic growth is volatile and depends heavily on capital projects the government pursues. In per capita terms, real growth is flat (0.00%) and is below that of peers over a 10-year weighted average, including Montserrat (1.10%), and Turks and Caicos (1.24%), among others in the same peer group of islands. Our ability to assess economic growth is limited by data inconsistencies, because St. Helena's compilation of GDP statistics is still evolving. According to official statistics, the government is the largest economic sector, contributing about 50% of GDP."

The profile continues, "Since the completion of the airport in 2016, economic growth has largely been negative because the government slowed capital spending. There has been a slow pick up in tourism activity, however, and other economic sectors, such as agriculture, are gradually developing." And . . . "In 2019, we estimate economic growth will be marginally positive, around 1%, supported by slight increases in government spending, along with continued moderate improvements in the tourism sector. Tourism is the most likely sector to contribute to economic growth in the short term, driven by niche tourist offerings,"

The fibre-optic cable is seen as our salvation in the short term, "We estimate that the economy will expand by 3% in real terms through 2022, supported by infrastructure investments. For instance, we expect the installation of a submarine fibre cable by 2021 will improve communication on the island." The written assessment ends with, "We expect inflation to remain low and stable over the next three years. It has generally been below 5% over the past five years and has been influenced primarily by price and exchange rate developments in the U.K. and South Africa, where the main imports come from."

Blue Belt Programme extended to March 2021

The St Helena Blue Belt Project was established in 2016 and set to run until March next year in the first instance. It has now been extended to March 2021 and may be extended further when progress is reviewed closer to the extended finishing date.

St Helena's Marine Protected Area was designated in September 2016. Since then the UK Government Blue Belt Programme was been supporting SHG's Marine Section in a wide range of activities aimed at updating legislation, developing an improved supervisory and enforcement organisation and increasing scientific knowledge of the marine environment and marine life within it.


The UK Blue Belt Programme assists all Overseas Territories who have committed to long term protection of the marine environment. This involves four million square kilometres of ocean; St Helena has almost half a million square kilometres of that total.

Elizabeth Clingham is the Blue Belt Co-ordinator, employed by the UK Government to oversee the project in conjunction with SHG who lead the St Helena Blue Belt Programme. Other participating marine conservation organisations are; the Centre for Environment, Fisheries and Aquaculture Science (CEFAS), the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), the International Commission for the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas (ICCAT), the UK Hydrographic Office (UKHO), The Blue Marine Foundation, the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) and the St Helena National Trust are the main partners in an important and wide-ranging list of marine conservation activities.

The most well known area of work in the Blue Belt Programme centres around the Royal Research Ships James Clark Ross, which surveyed seamounts and inshore areas in 2018 and the Discovery which completed follow up surveys in April this year. The research teams aboard the survey ships are good examples of co-operative working between various separate but related organisations. CEFAS, BAS, MMO and the Natural History Museum collaborated get as much data and information as possible from these rare and important marine surveys. The UKHO followed with another survey along the coast-line using the Enchanted Isle to get as close to the shoreline as possible. UKHO's Ian Davies visited St Helena once more last week to handover the survey data to SHG and to give a public presentation of some of the new information the survey uncovered.

The surveys extended our understanding of the marine environment, the data and information gathered is now being used to add to the science of physical oceanography, chemical oceanography, marine geology, and marine ecology. All of which can be put to practical use supporting other work which is equally important but not so spectacular.

Plans, policies and strategies needed to be updated and are now mostly complete. It was generally accepted marine legislation and the supporting regulations needed to also be updated but the underpinning strategies, polices and plans were put in place first so the legislation could relate to the fast

moving developments and changes in marine science and conservation.

Work was needed which allowed human activities such as waste water discharges, sand extraction, marine tourism and commercial fishing to continue in an environmentally friendly way. A marine accreditation scheme for marine tourism operators is part of this area of work.

Key reports have been compiled with others still to be completed which use new knowledge to extend understanding of marine biodiversity and the monitoring of it. Probably the most well known Blue Belt activity after the Royal Research Ship surveys is tagging fish. This is where ICCAT comes in. ICCAT started the Atlantic Ocean Tropical Tuna Tagging Programme (AOTTP) in June 2016 off the coast of Portugal. The tagging covers the North Atlantic islands, the Atlantic coastal areas of the US, Brazil, Africa and St Helena. An ICCAT report published earlier this year noted 92,000 tuna had been tagged and so far about 13% of the tags had been recovered. Once more it is the European Union that has provided most of the funds for this project – 15 million euros. The ICCAT tagging target across the Atlantic is 120,000 tuna.

A DarwinPlus funded project started tagging St Helena tuna in 2015. Now, the Blue Belt Programme is assisting ICCAT with the enormous job of tagging more than 5,000 tuna in St Helena waters. About 4,000 have been tagged so far with the target of 5,600 tagged tuna achieve by June next year. Some tagged fish have the ordinary plastic tag where the weight and length of the fish is recorded when tagged. If the fish are caught again in a subsequent year, changes are recorded

and compared. There are usually about 20% of fish tagged in this way which are caught and compared at a later date.

The electronic pop up satellite tag does a different job. The tags mean the fish can be tracked and its movements recorded. The electronic data stored in a tag is released to a satellite when the tag 'pops up' and comes to the ocean surface. The data received via the satellite is processed and the information combined with the data from thousands of other tags of the same type which have succeeded in popping up to the surface.

In St Helena about 4,000 of the 5,600 tags have been used and data has been captured from a surprisingly large number of them. The return rate for St Helena tagged tuna is about 50% of all tags used. This is much higher than the average of 20% or less across the AOTTP. The reason for this is that tuna in St Helena waters are not only the migratory tuna which swim across the oceans in search of food. Many St Helena tuna do not swim very far from the Island before they turn around and swim back. It is thought the upwelling of the current caused by the massive submarine mountain upon which St Helena sits brings with it adequate supplies of food for the tuna; this avoids the necessity for tuna to swim long distances in search of food.

Other related work includes satellite surveillance of illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing and the establishment of a marine laboratory and visitor centre on the Jamestown seafront in conjunction with the Blue Marine Foundation. Work





has started to make it possible to transfer HM Customs personnel from the freight terminal to the customs building. In a week or two the freight terminal will start to be transformed into a laboratory and visitor centre.

Stranded porpoise on a beach in Wales

Baby porpoises in waters off the UK are being exposed to a cocktail of chemicals in their mother's milk. Research found the most potent pollutants, which may be toxic to the brain, are passed from mother to calf. The chemicals are among the 200 or so polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), which accumulate in the bodies of dolphins, porpoises and whales.

PCBs were once used in plastics and paints. Banned decades ago, they hang around in the environment. The toxins that linger longest in a mother's body - and are considered more poisonous to the brain and nervous system - are transferred to infants in milk, a study found.

New law against smoking together with offences and fines

On Tuesday Exco will be discussing a draft anti-smoking Bill which the Public Health Committee have been discussing behind closed doors for the past two years. Last month all councillors were presented with the changes proposed and it is only this week the secret discussions are made public.

Called the Control of Tobacco and Related Products Bill, the provisions include prohibiting anyone smoking in any vehicle when a person under the age of 18 is also in the vehicle. Another provision is that merchants or individuals who import and sell tobacco products or intend to start doing so must be registered. SHG will charge a fee for the registration in a similar way to that required for the sale of alcohol.

It will be an offence for tobacco to be imported privately by any individual for personal consumption although the duty free allowance available when travelling to or from St Helena will remain.

Young people will be required to provide proof of age when buying cigarettes and tobacco sellers will be required to ask for it. Failure to demand proof of age will be a punishable offence under this law. Vending machines offering cigarettes will be banned to prevent young people buying cigarettes without needing to produce proof of age. Products that mimic cigarettes, such as toy or sweet cigarettes will also be banned.

Cigarettes will only be allowed for sale in complete and sealed packets. Breaking a pack to sell loose cigarettes will be banned.

Cigarettes will not be available for sale at premises related to healthcare, sports and recreation, government buildings and education facilities. This means cigarettes will not be available at events held on Francis Plain and other school sites. No advertising of cigarettes will be allowed in any form. This includes shops not having cigarettes on display at the counter. Only 'under the counter' sales will be allowed and the only sales aid to be used in shops will be a typed list of products and prices on a plain sheet of A4. A4 is specified in the

Memorandum for Executive Council but it is not specifically stated it is an offence to type the list on a smaller or larger sheet of paper; but who knows?

Tobacco products will only be available for import from either the UK or South Africa where legislation either exists or will be introduced which stipulates how the packaging should appear. That is usually a vomit-coloured almost plain pack with the cigarette brand displayed in a not very prominent manner. More prominent on the pack is a photo of a diseased lung or possibly someone bent double coughing up a lung (joke).

Seriously, tobacco packaging must be 'labelled in the prescribed manner'. The prescribed manner is as prescribed by current UK law or South African law on tobacco packaging. South African law on tobacco packaging is expected to be similar to UK law by 2022.

E cigarettes will also be regulated with the import or sale of sweet flavoured e-liquids or e-cigarette liquids with more than 19mg nicotine being prohibited. E-cigarette users will need to purchase these from registered sellers.

There are more than ten offences under the proposed legislation, attracting maximum fines ranging from £200 to £800 if found guilty.

NO INCREASE IN STORED WATER VOLUMES













Over the past week there has been no significant increase in stored water volumes, which remain at 39%. The recent rainfall experienced has not been enough to increase reservoir levels. The ground is still dry which means that the majority of rain water is being absorbed, leaving little surface water to enter the reservoirs. At least two weeks of continuous rainfall is needed to reach safe stored water levels.

Yesterday the mid-week flights commenced, and with visitor numbers expected to increase leading up to the festive season, it is essential that everyone keeps their consumption to essential use only.

Connect Saint Helena is continually pumping from Chubb's Spring and Hutt's Gate as well as from Fisher's Valley and Warren's Gut.

The public is reminded that we are currently under an Islandwide hosepipe ban. If you see anyone using water irresponsibly or notice a burst pipe or leak, then please inform Connect immediately.

WASTE MANAGEMENT SERVICES IMPLEMENT ALUMINIUM DRINK CANS RECYCLING

Waste Management Services (WMS) have implemented an Aluminium Drink Cans Recycling operation at Horse Point Landfill Site (HPLS). In recent weeks the WMS Team has skilfully re-purposed their existing drum crusher so that it can crush and bale Aluminium Drink Cans (ADC) ready for shipment. To date, three bales have been produced: 84x74x66cm (38kg), 84x74cmx69cm (43kg) and 84x74x71cm (45kg). Shipping ADC for recycling offers a sustainable income for St

Environmental Risk Manager, Mike Durnford, commented: "To achieve maximum gain from the ADC recycling initiative, we encourage residents and visitors to dispose of their aluminium drink cans for recycling in the Olympic Bins provided or blue wheelie bins located at Bars. To facilitate this initiative, more of these bins have been located around the Island, including in residential areas, at bus stops, tourist locations, the Airport and even along the Access Road. Olympic Bins allow users to make an ethical choice when depositing their waste, enabling the recycling of aluminium drink cans, glass bottles and plastics, all of which can now be recycled on-Island, as well as providing litter and cigarette butt disposal. Furthermore, a bay in the Public Recycling Facility at the Landfill site has been re-purposed for ADC."

The increase in Olympic Bins have been generously funded by Enterprise St Helena following Waste Management Serv-



ices successful funding application to develop recycling on the Island. Landfill Manager, Patrick Crowie, added:

"We will continue to process ADC at HPLS (utilising the existing manpower and resources) until there are sufficient bales to fill a 20 ft shipping container, at which point it will be shipped, via the MV Helena, to Collect-a-Can in Cape Town for sale and recycling."

Following the first successful shipment of a container of ADC, WMS hope to refine/improve the ADC collection and processing system. This could include the purchase of a magnetic sorting machine and/or bespoke baling machine.

The Sarkin Report published this week

Called the St Helena Political Governance Review, Professor Jeremy Sarkin's sixteen page report favours a form of ministerial government, clear lines of responsibility, governance processes that promote more transparency and accountability and quicker decision-making. Professor Sarkin will be visiting St Helena again, probably early in the New Year to talk through his report with a range of people in government and the community and hold public meetings.

Early in the introduction to his report Professor Sarkin quotes Governor Rushbrook who said in September this year, "we should find a better way to govern ourselves to ensure decision-making in weeks (not years) and individual elected councillors becoming directly responsible politically for the performance of directorates". This sets the tone for the rest of the report. Later in the report Sarkin quotes from written evidence submitted by the St Helena Tourism Association to the House of Commons Foreign Affairs Committee of Inquiry on the Future of the Overseas Territories, "Accountability, inclusiveness, partnership, equity and meaningful communication are indispensable if governance of the Overseas Territories is to be effective, efficient, supported and respected by the citizens of the British Overseas Territories." SHG submitted written evidence to the same House of Commons Committee stating, "We believe that it is timely to consider a possible move from the current Committee system to a different model of government that would increase the self-determination of St Helena and provide a suitable framework for an island that is committed to reducing aid dependency and moving towards a more independent future". To bring unanimity to the question of governance of and for St Helena, Sarkin also draws on a statement from the UK Government white paper on the Overseas Territories published in 2012 - Security, Success and Sustainability - where the aspiration of HMG is to give power to people and communities across the UK and the Overseas Territories to drive reform by strengthening accountability and having more transparency.

In making his recommendations Sarkin was therefore pushing at an open door. He points out that the five committees (Education, Public Health etc.) do not align with the directorates in the administrative arm of government and that chairmen of committees are not authorised to make decisions except through their committees. It is also pointed out that the Governor, on the advice of Executive Council decides on the number of committees and what remits they have. Aligning every committee directly to a specific government department with the chairman (or minister) directly and politically responsible for the specific government department will encourage accountability and transparency.

In the section of the report on why the present system of government should be changed Sarkin points out the current committee system does not promote accountability and transparency and that neither specific nor overall direction is provided by the heads of government departments/directorates in the absence of responsibility being given to committee chairmen. The report cites some public perceptions of how government works. Exco and Legco are seen as ineffective and indecisive and decisions are left hanging if there is not a consensus of opinion to act in a particular way. This leads to



delays, deferments, more discussions and fewer decisions. The report continues using words and phrases such as slow, cumbersome, there is not always clarity, long time to be decided upon, long time to be implemented, SHG frustrates the various governance processes (some councillors say) and often impedes successful operationalisation (?) of policy formation, legislative development and the implementation of new policy or law. Continuing in the same vein Sarkin points out administrative structures are not well defined. Who has responsibility for what and who should be taking the initiative or carrying an issue through to the next stage is sometimes blurred. Often, processes are ad hoc and spontaneous and there are few clear mechanisms for suggestions or ideas to be taken up. There are no systematic means to examine proposals in a clear and orderly fashion. No time lines seem to exist and there is little organisational process and structural planning. Number 28 in this section giving reasons for changing the way we are governed is the lack of clarity and overlaps in which committee has responsibility for what. There is also a need for greater political vision about the future and how the various challenges are addressed.

Sarkin then goes o to summarise how other Overseas Territories are governed. Most use some form of ministerial government with just St Helena and the Falkland Islands using the committee system. However, as the Falklands government is in an ideal and enviable financial position their decision-making processes are not in the precarious position we in St Helena find ourselves. Professor Sarkin then points out that having ministers, each with responsibility for a specific area of government services means there is an individual who is answerable for each function of government. This helps accountability and transparency. The minister responsible must explain, justify, defend and take the initiative for that part of government for which he or she is the political leader.

Moving onto what a future governance model for St Helena might look like, Sarkin considers, briefly, refining the present committee system but rejects this option because the problems that exist now would continue. We would still be dragged

down with slow, cumbersome, unaccountable and problematic decision-making processes. Individual accountability rather than decision by committee is a key change to make governance processes work far better than they do now. Sarkin also points out that Exco or its successor should play a greater role in policy direction and be responsible for implementing policy by getting the administrative arm of government (the heads of the directorates) to meet targets, deadlines and timelines. If the government administration fails, it is the political leaders who are answerable. Professor Sarkin states the government administration should be operating under the executive and be accountable to the executive and this is not happening at present.

Sarkin supports the establishment of a Chief Minister who leads the small team of ministers who are politically responsible for the success or failure of government decisions and their implementation. However it is made clear the politicians will need support from technical, legal and specialists and advisors to carry out their responsibilities. The report also points out the political leaders will need training at the start of and throughout their term of office.

Sarkin also states the administration should be more integrated and flexible; able to respond to changing circumstances, implement new policy quickly and work coherently with executive and legislative structures. This will mean a proper alignment of the committees with the directorates. Sarkin suggests 5 or 6 ministers leading the political side of 5 or 6 directorates.

The report considers returning to a number of constituencies instead of having the all-island vote and discusses the introduction of political parties but does not draw any conclusions on these subjects or make recommendations. He does propose greater authority and influence for the Public Accounts Committee with more individuals from the community as members and fewer elected representatives. The Chief Auditors role requires "revision", which presumably means it needs strengthening as does the "update" required for audit legislation.

Dear Editor.

While Saint Helena may value its link with the UK, should it not look to adopt a new flag? The Union Jack (yes, it can be called that on land as well as on sea!) would continue to be flown, but the current flag, being a Blue Ensign, is too derivative, as well as the shield from the coat of arms not being very easy to draw or paint - or tattoo. Mind you, Libya under Muammar Gaddafi went to the other extreme and made the national flag plain green.

Yes, Saint Helena is part of the 'British family', but not everyone in the family has to wear the same clothes. Perhaps its Blue Ensign is a useful reminder that the island is actually a British Overseas Territory and not some tinpot African dictatorship, but what good did that do in the face of hostile UK media coverage? Gibraltar uses a banner of the coat of arms it inherited from Spain, with its Blue Ensign rarely ever flown, but that hasn't detracted from its sense of British identity.


In fairness, New Zealand recently voted

to keep the Blue Ensign, and the Cook Islands, in free association with New Zealand, replaced their original flag, green with a ring of gold stars, with their own Blue Ensign forty years ago, while Niue's flag is a more striking 'Yellow Ensign', with the Union Jack defaced with gold stars. On the other hand, Hawaii's flag has the Union Jack in the top left hand corner, despite it never having been part of the British Empire.

If I were to design a new flag for Saint Helena, but one that retained the Union

Jack, I would have a 'Green Ensign', with a yellow disc containing the wire bird. Alternatively, it could have a red cross, to represent England, in recognition that it was English before it was British, though it could be another colour. Of course it's up to the Saints themselves, at home and in the diaspora, to decide what a new flag should look like, if they even want one at all.

Your Opinion Counts

The United Kingdom's primary legal responsibilities for St Helena derive from Article 73, Chapter X1 of the Charter of the United Nations.

The Charter is binding on the United Kingdom under international law.

Accordingly, the United Kingdom has a fundamental obligation to ensure that the people of St Helena achieve political, economic, social, and educational advancement and constructive measures of development.

The most recent reinstatements of the United Kingdom's obligations were made in the 2012 White Paper on the Overseas Territories.

The foreword to the White Paper states: 'This Government is ambitious for our Territories as we are ambitious for the United Kingdom. We want to see our communities flourish in partnership, with strong and sustainable local economies.'

The executive summary to the White Paper states: 'Each Territory has a unique community and it is for the territory to shape the future of its own community.'

The Overview of the 2012 White Paper commits the Government of the United Kingdom to work with the St Helena Government to build a 'vibrant and flourishing community'.

Article 73 of the UN Charter, the 2012 White Paper, St Helena's Sustainable Economic Development Plan and the recent Independent Economic Review that explored a 2050 vision for St Helena are all documents of ambitious intent. However, without the necessary sustained associated actions, alone, the ambitious intent written in documents will never provide the social and economic development, advancement and progress required for that vibrant and flourishing community in St Helena.

Without sustained adequate financial support from the United Kingdom to maintain the island's progression to social and economic self-sufficiency St Helena will continue to find it very diffi-

cult to make creditable headway.

The St Helena Government directorates are in the final stages of preparing budget submissions for the next financial year. The essential option of a three year budget provision from the United Kingdom has been removed from the table by DFID.

In preparation for the 2020/21 budget negotiations that are expected to begin in December between elected members and DFID officials, SHG officers instructed directorates to provide calculations to elected members according to "zero-base budgeting". The uplift required for all SHG directorates totalled seven million pounds.

One director introduced his budget for initial consideration at committee stage as a "bare-bones, zero-based budget". Just one example of where more funding is necessary in social welfare: The recent review of the Social Security Ordinance 2011 has confirmed the flaws of a social welfare system that has had ongoing detrimental consequences for many of our vulnerable people over the last eight years. The review working group has established that addressing the flaws in the legislation will require significant funding – some £800,000. If the required funding cannot be found, then the definition of the household, according to the current legislation, will remain law. Consequently, many of our vulnerable people - particularly our senior citizens, will not be able to access the Income Related Benefit in their own right. The purpose and principle of the Social Security Ordinance should be to protect our vulnerable people.

Of course there is no such thing as a "magic money tree". Nevertheless, the United Kingdom allocates some 13 billion pounds, to the overseas aid budget and it is the stated policy of the United Kingdom that the reasonable assistance needs of St Helena are a first call on the UK's aid programme.

The financial assistance St Helena has already received from the United Kingdom is by no means overlooked, and I take this opportunity to express grati-

tude on behalf of the people of St Helena. However, it is a serious concern that before the 2020/21 budget negotiations between DFID and elected members have even started, DFID officials have just recently instructed the SHG Financial Secretary that St Helena will now have to accept a "flatline budget". The Financial Secretary have therefore instructed directorates to further shave the bones of their already bare-bones budgeting considerations. Consequently, the elected representatives' position in the budget negotiations, on behalf of the people of St Helena, has been seriously weakened by the pre-empted conditions and dominance of DFID.

Overall, the minimum budgetary aid uplift St Helena requires from the United Kingdom for the 2020/21 budget is 4 million pounds, and negotiations with DFID are expected to be difficult. Following recent instructions from DFID, SHG directorates have now been forced to reduce their budget deficit calculations down from 4 million pounds to just 1.7 million pounds for the next financial year. A flatline budgetary aid package for St Helena with or without the 1.7 million pound uplift from the United Kingdom will mean serious challenges for the people of St Helena.

The failure to secure adequate budgetary aid from the United Kingdom will mean a serious detrimental impact on SHG public services and will increase operational risks.

Yes, the United Kingdom has ambitious intent for the community of St Helena to become vibrant and to flourish. However, at this period in time, the reality is St Helena desperately needs sufficient financial aid from the United Kingdom just to help our community move beyond the current debilitating social and economic stagnation.

And that, Mr Speaker, is our reality message to DFID and to the UK Government.

The Declaration sets out universal values and a common standard for all peoples and all nations. It establishes the equal dignity and worth of every person. It was drafted by representatives of diverse legal and cultural backgrounds from all over the world. Over the years the United Nations has expanded human rights to include specific standards for women, children, persons with disabilities, minorities and other vulnerable groups, who now possess the rights that protect them from discrimination that had been common in many societies.

principles are as relevant today as they were in 1948. We need to stand up for our own rights and those of others. We can take action in our own daily lives to uphold the rights that protect us. Human rights are at the heart of sustainable development. Without human dignity we cannot drive sustainable development.

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights empowers us all. Its

In St Helena's Constitution there is a chapter that sets out important human rights on St Helena, other rights are found in our laws. There are sixteen rights in our Constitution, called Clauses.

The role of the St Helena Equality and Human Rights Commission is to empower people to resolve their disputes and to shape law and policy, advocate for change and work closely with a range of partners to create a fairer society; preventing similar problems for others who feel marginalised, excluded and discriminated against.

AMENDMENT TO DRONE FLYING PERMISSIONS ON ST HELENA

A change has been made to the "no fly zone" permissions to allow limited use of drones in this zone on St Helena.

Previously the no fly zone (red zone on the drone map) did not allow any flights by drones except for emergency purposes. A directive issued by Air Safety Support International (ASSI), valid from 2 December 2019, now permits restricted use of drones within this area as long as two conditions are both met:

- 1. Drone activity must be conducted for legitimate research purposes, and
- 2. Drone activity must be authorised by St Helena Airport Limited **prior** to any activity occurring.

Accordingly, should drone users who meet the two conditions wish to conduct flights within the "no fly zone" on St Helena, they should contact St Helena Airport in the first instance.

All drone users are asked to respect the requirements of the directive and should understand that misuse of this opportunity to fly in the "no fly zone" may result in its withdrawal to the detriment of possible future research. Any unauthorised drone activity in the no fly zone will be dealt with accordingly.

Please note that this amendment makes **no** changes to the existing requirements of the "safe" and "restricted" fly zones (green and yellow on the drone map).

DRAFT SATELLITE GROUND STATION POLICY OUT FOR CONSULTATION

St Helena Government, with support from AB5 Consulting, are developing a Satellite Ground Station Policy for the licencing of Permanent Earth Stations (PES) and Receive Only Earth Stations (ROES) on St Helena. The draft Policy is available at: www.sainthelena.gov.sh/government/public-consultation/.

The work is to support the development of the Satellite Ground Station sector, which is an export sector with growth potential identified in St Helena's Sustainable Economic Development Plan 2018-2028.

The Licencing Requirements outlined within the draft Policy are **not** planned to apply to small satellite receivers for domestic use, VSATs, nor antennas on moving platforms of any type (e.g. those used by ships, aeroplanes, vehicles and satellite phones). There are also proposed exemptions where uses are for broadcasting, aeronautical services, purposes associated with the navigation of ships or the safety of shipping, scientific or experimental purposes, or uses on behalf of the Crown, as is presided upon by St Helena's Telecommunications Ordinance.

The Licencing Requirements outlined within the draft Policy **are** planned to apply to commercial and non-commercial ground station activities and amateur VHF radio users, amongst other applications. If you are an existing licence holder or potential licence holder, we are particularly keen to hear your views on the draft Policy. The consultation on the draft Policy will run for a period of four weeks ending on 27 December 2019. Crop Watch 6

Crop Watch this week will give an overview of crop diseases and look at "cultural" control we can use

The Problem with Diseases

Diseases are a catch all term for problems with our crops. They normally refer to fungal, viral and bacterial damage to plants. They are tiny living things that thrive on the crops we grow. They feed and multiply on foliage roots and fruit, and in the process damage and can eventually kill the crop by using up all its energy. Most are specialised to just one or two

healthy

crops and need them to survive. Some can lie dormant in the soil for many years waiting for the host crop to be planted. Other can survive on alternative plants,

weeds and trees or residues of old crops.

Fungal Disease

Plants are infected with fungal diseases by spores landing on them. Spores can be spread by wind, rain splash, and tools. It is very difficult to prevent the spread of fungal disease, but good field cleanliness will reduce and slow the spread.

Symptoms of infection are brown, grey, black areas on plants and eventual wilting and dying.

Potato Late Blight is a good example of a fungal disease.

Viruses

Viruses are normally spread by insects. An aphid feeding on an infected plant will suck up the virus. When it moves to another plant and begins to feed it will pass on the virus. The aphid itself is completely unaffected. The only way to prevent the spread of viruses is to control the insects that spread them.

Virus symptoms are bright yellowing, disfigured leaves and stems and rolled leaves; e.g. Potato Leaf Roll Virus

Bacterial Disease

Bacterial disease can arrive on seed. Once the bacteria is in the soil it can stay there for many years, lying dormant and waiting for the host plant to be planted again. The bacteria can be transported to new areas in soil on boots, tools

and machinery, as well as plants themselves. It can also move in the flow of water.

Plants infected with bacterial diseases often wilt quickly and die. For example; Bacterial Wilt.

Cultural Control of Plant Diseases

Prevention is better than cure! The best way to stay healthy is to create a clean environment, have nutritious food present and plenty of water.



Sustainable Lobster Populations for St Helena

Since the start of the Darwin Plus 077 Lobster Project 14 months ago, the Environment, Natural Resources & Planning Directorate's Marine Conservation team has been working hard to gather as much information as possible on the local lobsters.

To date, around 1200 lobsters have been tagged with plastic tags to gather information on how fast they grow, and where they are living . Around 50 different sites with depths down to 20m have been explored around the Island looking at the abundance and density of the lobsters. This will give the Marine Conservation team information on how many lobsters there are in each area to help estimate how many lobsters there are in St Helena's waters.

Since August 2019, an acoustic grid has been installed to track the movements of 25 lobsters over the period of one year and, in October 2019, the team has started to deploy lobster pots on a regular basis around the Island. The lobster pots will help the team to get information on lobsters in areas where it is difficult to dive and increase the number of caught slipper (stump) lobsters from deeper waters.

The pots will be used for the next eight months so if you see them please leave them undisturbed as they are very important for this project. The team have also lost five of these pots in the past few weeks. If you see or find any of the pots or recover a tagged lobster please contact the team at Essex house, via tel: 22270 or email:

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



Sunday 25th August as we bid goodbye to beautiful Bermuda we took our flight back to the UK. Tired and exhausted from the travelling within different time zones, we headed to the Reading Sports. Overwhelmed with the meet and greet of family and friends and using the last of energy within our tired bodies we were able to send live greetings to our family and friends. After a few hours at the Reading Sports and with energy now at the lowest we took the journey to Southampton for a well-deserved good night's rest.

Monday 26th August a bright and early start saw us heading off to Windsor to witness the splendour of the changing of the guards followed by a whip round the shops on the high street. It didn't end there as we were yet to encounter another experience – 'The World's Number One' Water Sports and Activity Park, 'Liquid Leisure' which is home to Europe's Largest Aqua Park, set on one of the most beautiful private freshwater lakes amongst stunning parkland in the heart of Berkshire. If you are not a swimmer then you will lose out! Excitedly we partook in the water sports and it was definitely a Total Wipe-out!

Tuesday 27th August a must on the agenda was a visit to Brownsea Island to capture its history. Situated in Poole Harbour in Dorset, it is accessible only via boat or ferry. Boarding the ferry in the early morning mist we headed off and were able to discover how the island has been shaped over time and its special significance today. Brownsea Island was the location of an experimental camp in 1907 by Badon Powel which lead to the formation of the Scout movement. With the exception of the little chapel which sits prominently and a few other buildings Brownsea Island is owned by the National Trust. Brownsea Island has a small ornamental population of peacocks, which we were fortunate to see however they were not brazen enough to showcase their feathers. There is

a large population of non-native sika deer on the island and the girls were fascinated to have spotted one. In 1963 a Scout campsite was opened by Olave Baden-Powell, when the island became a nature conservation area owned by the National Trust. In 1973, a Scout Jamboree was held on the island with 600 Scouts. In August 2007, 100 years after the first experimental camp, Brownsea Island was the focus of worldwide celebrations of the centenary of Scouting. Four camps were set up on the island including a replica of the original 1907 camp, and hundreds of Scouts and Girl Guides from 160 countries travelled to the island to take part in the celebrations.

Wednesday 28th August a visit to Foxes Lease and Brighton Foxes lease is a training and activity centre of Girl guiding near Lyndhurst, Hampshire, UK. The Foxlease estate has been owned and managed by the Guides since 1922. The estate is 65 acres and includes a variety of self-catering accommodation, campsites and a tented village. During the Second World War Foxes Lease briefly became a home for evacuated children. 'Bewilder Box Escape Room' Brighton was a unique experience which offered fun, mystery, teamwork and excitement and of course the feeling of victory – We Escaped!!! Brighton Palace Pier, located in the heart of Brighton was a wind down for us all.

Thursday 29th August Last day in the UK. As we ventured out for a game of bowling, sense of direction was somewhat underrated, yet the game brought out another challenge and yippee we soon mastered some good techniques! Shopping rounded the afternoon off and it was time to pick up our tracks and depart the UK.

Friday 30th August Landed back in Johannesburg where the quaint little Dove's Nest Guest House awaited us and an evening meal of rice, beef stew and pumpkin made it felt like a real 'Home Coming'.

Saturday 31st August In a matter of hours we landed safe and sound on our home ground. Home Sweet Home! Family, friends and our Guiding sisters awaited our arrival. What an exhausting and amazing journey enjoyed by all. Our three weeks allowed us to bond, become exposed, build confidence, engaged in challenges and experiences whilst discovering the world around us. WE SURVIVED! The St Helena Bermuda Jamboree Team would like to extend massive thanks to all who supported us in any way to afford the trip. A huge 'Thank You' to the parents of the girls for entrusting your daughters with us. We brought them home safe and sound! Our deepest gratitude to our Commissioner, Heather Cowdry for her unconditional support throughout and special thanks to our Chief Leader Winifred Thomas for executing the lead and congratulations on achieving the International Camp licence. Thanks to our UK chauffeur, Mike Brown who was at our back and call in the UK (seat belts fasten)!

Pleasing to say that the four girls embraced all challenges with confidence and we sincerely hope that our wonderful experiences will inspire others!

Circumnavigation Plaque Unveiled

At an event at the Museum last Saturday St Helena commemorate a special event. The special event is James and Hannah Herne and their family sailing around the world in their yacht Carpe Diem. It took them four and a half years. It is an amazing achievement for the family and for the Island.

St Helena Independent extensively covered the Herne family's circumnavigation in a series of articles in the middle of last year.





The letter that sparked the Napoleonic war! King George III's letter stating his intention to declare hostilities against Napoleon in 1803 sells at auction for £11,430 (more than 11 times its original estimate!)

King George III signalled his intent to go to war with France on May 14,1803, four days before Britain formally declared war against Napoleon's forces.

It was sold at to a private collector who bid for it by telephone, fetching more than 11 times its pre-sale estimate of £500 to £1,000.

King George III, the "mad king who lost the North American colonies" is now thought to have suffered from porphyria, a hereditary blood disorder. One symptom is blue urine.

The letter, sold at Cheffins in Cambridge, was written by King George III to Lord Hawkesbury, then Secretary of State.

Charles Ashton, a director at Cheffins said: 'This letter is a defining moment of history showing the King's intention to go to war with France and Napoleon.'

The King wrote in the letter that he had 'perused the dispatch and private letter from Lord Whitworth', a British politician and diplomat who at the time of the letter was ambassador in Paris. "The conduct of France has been equally unfair to the last," he wrote, "and though conscious of the evils that must be entailed on many countries by the renewal of war. Yet the conviction that by the restless disposition of the Ruler of France this event could not long have been kept off, it seems necessary to attend alone to the best modes of repelling the violence with effect, and the attacking those objects which our present means render attainable. The King will remain in town to execute any steps that the present moment may require." He signs off the letter as 'George R'.

The letter was sold by an anonymous private vendor.

ST HELENA MAGISTRATES' COURT

28th November 2019

Selwyn Stroud (19) of Botanical Gardens, pleaded guilty to two counts of Common Assault and one count of Using Threatening Words or Behaviour. He also admitted being in breach of a Community Sentence which was a direct alternative to custody. He entered his plea at the earliest opportunity. He was dealt with by way of a custodial sentence for the two assaults and criminal damage of 40 days each and was re-sentenced to the offences of common assault, assault occasioning actual bodily harm and affray to serve 2 months and one week custody. All sentences are consecutive.

Anelka Leo (20) of Trap Cott, pleaded guilty to two counts of theft and one of criminal damage. He entered his plea at the earliest opportunity. He was sentenced to 20 hours Community Service Order in respect of each matter and ordered to pay compensation of £215.00.
